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# The Big Idea

Accessible materials can be used by anyone in any manner, regardless of ability...

- sensory, mobility, cognitive; others
- with or without accommodations such as assistive technology

...or device

- desktop, mobile, specialized

Accessible design benefits everyone, not just people with disabilities

- **universal design or inclusive design**

# Accessibility 101

- People with disabilities use computers, too!
- Assistive technology includes screen readers, braille displays, screen magnifiers, adaptive keyboards and mice
- Accessible documents are built with semantic markup, good structure, and accessibility features

# Why bother with accessibility?

- What is your mission?
  - Making documents
  - Want people to read them
  - Want everyone to read them
  
- Who do you hire?
  - Best candidates you can get
  - Candidate pool should include everyone
  - Hiring practices and production tools must be accessible

# Regulations

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- ADA – Americans with Disabilities Act
  - Title I: Employment
  - Title II: State and local governments
  - Title III: Public accommodations
- Rehabilitation Act
  - Section 504: Education, K-12 and post-secondary
  - Section 508: Federal government
- Marrakesh Treaty

# Regulations

- **Marrakesh Treaty** to Facilitate Access to Published Works for Persons Who Are Blind, Visually Impaired, or Otherwise Print Disabled
  - Ratified in the U.S. on January 28, 2019
  - Goal: to increase access to printed materials for the world's population of persons with print disabilities, especially in developing and least-developed countries
  - Implementation: permits accessible books to be exchanged across borders between participating authorized entities without requesting authorization from the copyright owner
  
- Safeguards to protect the commercial market for materials in accessible format
  - This ensures that publishers who choose to make their books available in accessible formats can sell them in the marketplace

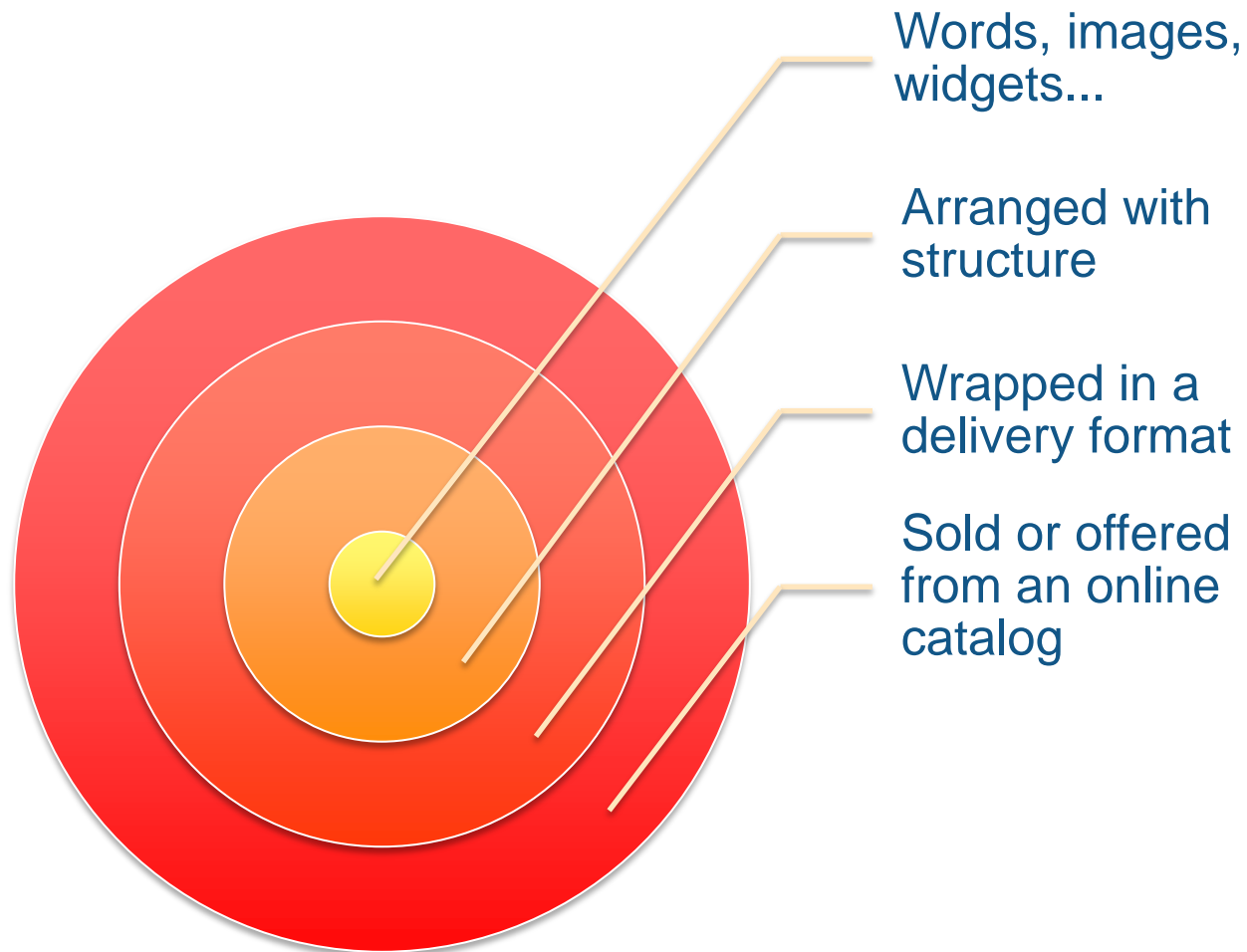

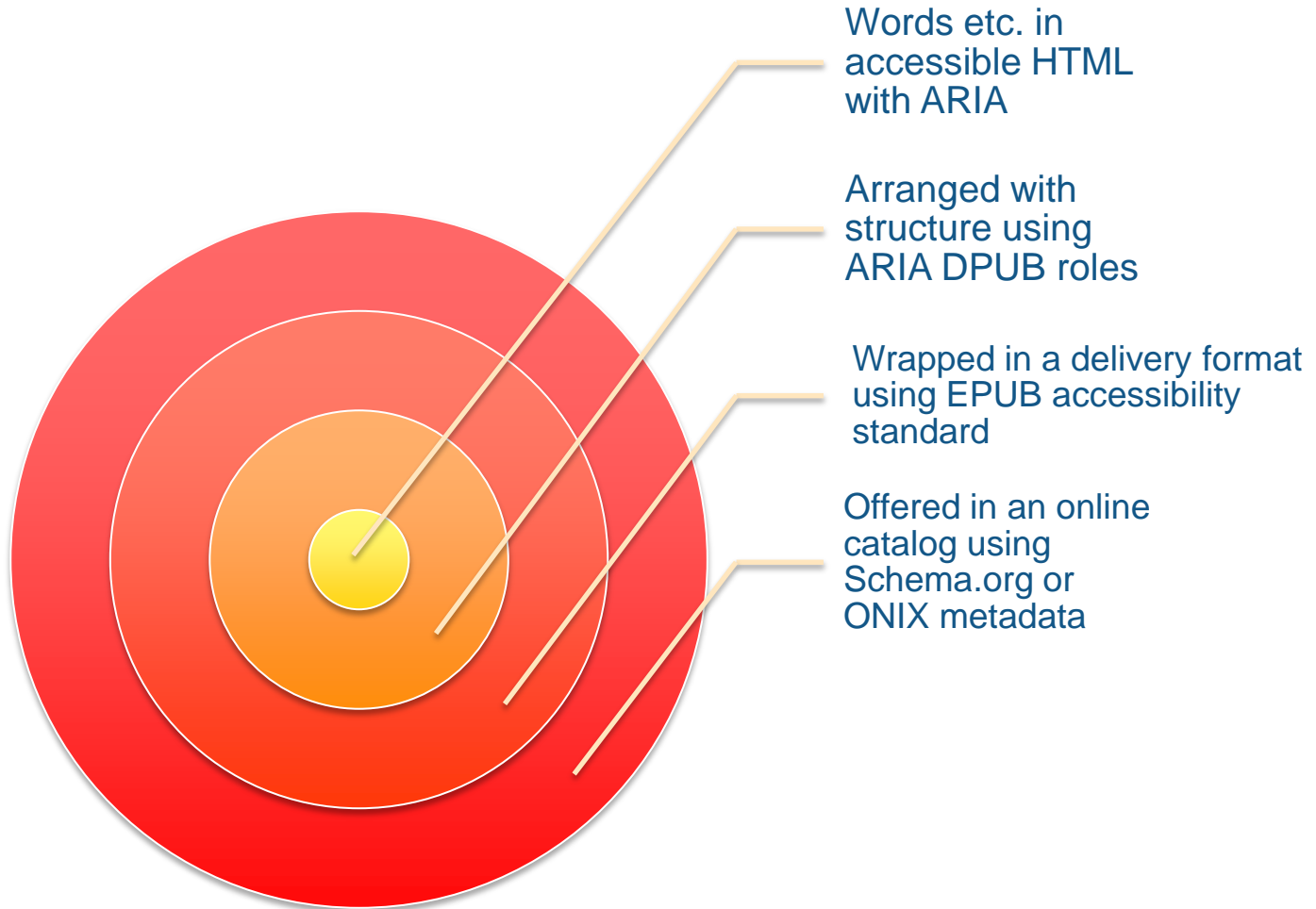
# So many standards!

- Web standards from W3C: WCAG, HTML, ARIA
- WAI-ARIA Digital Publishing Module
- EPUB for Education
- EPUB Accessibility: Conformance and Discovery Requirements for EPUB Publications
- PDF/UA
- Schema.org and ONIX metadata

# What is a digital publication?



# Standards guide accessibility in every layer



- PDF/UA (Universal Access; ISO 14289)
- Key is proper export from InDesign or other tools
  - Ensure reading order is correct
  - Ensure elements like tables and figures are inserted in the right spot and with summaries

- HTML5
- Web Content Accessibility Guidelines 2.1
  - Start with “Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) Overview”
  - Perceivable, Operable, Understandable and Robust
  - Success criteria
  - Specific techniques and code samples (HTML, CSS, PDF, ARIA, Flash, other technologies)
- User Agent Accessibility Guidelines 2.0
  - Ebook readers are user agents
- Authoring Tools Accessibility Guidelines 2.0

- Accessible Rich Internet Applications 1.1
  - adds accessibility semantics to a host language, i.e. HTML or EPUB
  - always use native HTML or EPUB when that has semantics
  - layer on ARIA, but not too much
- Digital Publishing WAI-ARIA Module 1.1
  - defines a set of WAI-ARIA roles specific to helping users of assistive technologies navigate through long-form documents



- EPUB 3.2 nearly finished
  - 3.0 added accessibility support
  - 3.1 new accessibility features but broke version number backward-compatibility
  - 3.2 keeps 3.1 improvements but restores version number compatibility
  
- EPUB for Education (formerly EduPUB):  
profile of EPUB with rich educational semantics
  
- EPUB Accessibility: Conformance and Discovery Requirements for EPUB Publications
  - Now a W3C submission (IDPF site not available)
  - Includes a techniques document (not currently available)

- ONIX
  - extensive accessibility features list
  - Code List 196
  
- Schema.org and a11ymetadata.org
  - accessibility features, hazards, control, API, access mode, access mode sufficient, accessibility summary
  
- Work in progress: harmonize ONIX and Schema.org accessibility metadata

- Use the standards for text and navigation
- Make content accessible
  - Image descriptions
  - Video with captions and audio description
  - Accessible interactives including video players
- Make tool interfaces accessible
  - For users with disabilities
  - For creating accessible content
